Brookwood in Georgetown (BIG)

Brookwood in Georgetown (BIG) provides a God-centered, innovative vocational and residential community for adults with special needs, changing the way the world sees and experiences this population. Established in 2008, the program supports approximately 100 “citizens,” employing them in varied work experiences that match their abilities and optimize their potential, and opportunities for them to achieve self-worth, earn a wage, and contribute to the world in meaningful ways by creating beautiful marketable items.

BIG has been voted best boutique in Georgetown each of the past 4 years and operates a café which has a 5-star Yelp rating. Citizens work in both, giving them opportunity to interact with the community. As they develop and thrive in those settings, citizens fulfill the second part of BIG’s mission-to change the way the world sees and experiences this population.

Last year BIG expanded to include residential services. They built two homes, one to house eight women, one to house eight men. They also leased two new houses to provide homes to five women and two house-parent families. Their long term goal-an expanded residential community-was launched this year when they acquired a 75 acre tract of land in Weir TX, six miles east of their current facilities. The end goal is to create a 125-acre community capable of housing 80 citizens.

The Worship Place contributions to BIG support a wide range of operational requirements such as facility maintenance, and activities such as games, events, mentoring and Bible Study materials.

The Caring Place

For over 35 years, The Caring Place has provided a safety net to assist with basic human needs. Its unique challenge and greatest accomplishment in 2020 was in sustaining operations with just 29 staff with volunteer support suspended due to Covid concerns for most of the year. Its target audience is those local individuals and families who need assistance to meet basic human needs.

The Caring Place tailors comprehensive solutions to address needs of people in financial crisis, such as help with rent and mortgage assistance, utility bills, certain medical, dental, and optical procedures; prescriptions, transportation, temporary shelter, and high interest loan payoffs.

The program provides other assistance by operating a food pantry, clothing and household items thrift shops, a fan drive, referrals, education and client-centered case management.

Throughout 2020, The Caring Place upheld its mission by assisting over 7,700 distinct individuals and 3,900 distinct families; supporting 29,000 visits to its food pantry, and distributing nearly 1.5 million pounds of food.

The Worship Place funds are used to directly assist local families in crisis with basic human needs--assistance with rent and utilities payments, transportation, certain medical needs, and food.

Children of the King

Children of the King (formerly known as Boys to Men of God / Daughters of the King) has as its mission the sharing of Jesus Christ in a family atmosphere with children age 4-12 who live in father-absent homes. Top priority is safety and security of the children, then to meet their practical needs by building relationships through family (food, play, activities, study) and teaching Bible truths, promises, and values. Multi-generational Christian volunteers serve as mentors at program activities. For long term continuity and growth, the program introduces children and families to a local church as a place for them to receive further mentoring and nurturing of their spiritual growth.

The program focuses its efforts in the local area of Georgetown, Round Rock, Leander, and Pflugerville. It provides van service to shuttle children between their homes (many of whom live in one of six apartment complexes in the areas served) and multiple after-school programs each week. The program reaches 200 children and 150 adults, and averages 50-75 participants at each session.

The Worship Place's financial contributions help cover the cost of program activities, transportation to events, small group mentoring, Bible study materials, facility maintenance, and a host of other expenses. The Worship Place's 2021 donation will cover approximately 20% of the program's financial obligations.

Children of the King offers The Worship Place family many opportunities to serve as volunteer mentors, drivers, cooks and meal servers, and to assist in facility and outdoor play area maintenance.

Christ Child Society of Texas, Capital Area

Christ Child Society of Texas, Capital Area is a 100-member non-profit organization operating under the Catholic Diocese of Austin, one of 46 such organizations operating throughout the country. Its mission is to provide fellowship and service to community youth who are most in need of spiritual, physical, emotional, or economic support. It focuses support in Bell, Williamson, and Travis counties.

In fulfillment of its mission, the program manages several efforts: in a typical year, it assembles and distributes over 1,000 layettes containing basic items to assist young mothers in the care of their infant children; distributes bereavement sets of hand-made gowns, blankets, and bonnets to families who lose a baby before or after birth; distributes over 300 handmade hygiene bags of items to elementary students in need; and provides winter caps and gloves to students in need.

The program also distributes drawstring backpacks filled with full size hygiene products to homeless middle and high school students throughout the Round Rock school district. These packs are designed to meet the student's hygiene needs for the summer. In addition, it provides clothing items to homeless teens, and participates in feeding dinner items to homeless and at-risk students participating in *The Nest* program in Georgetown.

By way of acknowledging The Worship Place's support the Society includes with each layette a pamphlet from the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association.

Faith In Action - Georgetown

Faith in Action-Georgetown was formed through a coalition of churches. The program provides services to Georgetown seniors who no longer drive or who cannot afford a vehicle. Services include reliable door-to-door assisted transportation and a Buddy Program that maintains recurring phone contact to check on the welfare of enrollees. It also maintains a closet of medical mobility equipment.

Each of the program's services is designed to support senior independence by responding to needs for mobility, companionship, and safety. The intended outcome is helping the elderly maintain their health and ability to stay connected with their community while living independently in their homes.

The program embraces the biblical call to serve widows (42% of the program's client base) and the underprivileged. Its services also provide a safe alternative to an impaired senior risking driving to obtain food, other essentials, or social interaction. Seniors living alone are at greater risk, and nearly 3 in 5 of the seniors supported by the program live alone.

As 2020 came to an end, 534 seniors were being supported by over 160 trained volunteers. The program provided nearly 6,000 buddy care calls, 3,900 point to point rides, and supported nearly 100 requests for medical equipment.

Fellowship of Christian Athletes

Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) exists to lead every coach and athlete into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ and the church. FCA engages, equips, and empowers close to 2 million people each year, fostering values of integrity, service, teamwork and excellence in every coach and athlete it reaches.

The Worship Place supports FCA in Williamson County. The local program reaches 200 coaches and approximately 4,500 students in schools throughout the county and in Pflugerville with a presence in over 60 schools in those areas.

FCA operates a “To and Through the Coach” approach that seeks to equip young athletes to become Christ-like role models to their families, teams, schools, and communities. FCA works on campuses through coaches, through camps, and community events. Last year, FCA in Williamson County reported seeing 75 kids make decisions to accept Christ as their savior; put 288 Bibles into the hands of coaches and kids; hosted 77 FCA Huddles on Williamson County school campuses, and sent 140 kids and coaches to a FCA Camp.

Members of The Worship Place participate in Celebrity Golf events and fundraising banquets hosted by FCA. TWP members can also assist in supporting local sports camps and hosting out of town campers.

Georgetown Meals On Wheels

Meals on Wheels, a national organization, is a service provided to residents of Williamson County for the past 45 years. Meals on Wheels in Georgetown started as a collaboration between area churches belonging to the Georgetown Ministerial Alliance and a local community action agency, Opportunities for Williamson-Burnet Counties (OWBC).

The Georgetown Meals on Wheels program exists to provide physical and financial support to the OWBC Meals on Wheels program. Under this arrangement, OWBC staff screens potential clients, plans meals, and cooks and packages meals for locations in Burnet, Georgetown, Leander and Taylor. Georgetown volunteers perform meal delivery to nearly 200 income-qualified seniors in Georgetown and limited outlying areas. The program also serves congregate meals at the Madella Hilliard Center in Georgetown.

The Worship Place provides financial support, and along with other local congregations, shares the duty of delivering food to recipients every nine weeks. We receive our annual schedule in December, which allows The Worship Place volunteers to arrange their schedules and pre-plan their support of deliveries.

The Prayer Collective

The Prayer Collective is a Christian outreach ministry in Georgetown that aims to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the local community through sacrificial acts of service and fellowship. Its primary focus is on the Gospel and spending time in the Bible, discipling to the forgotten, poor and elderly. Its application for funding support states, “We serve well over 30 different individuals on a regular basis.”

Donnie Boyd is the program founder. He hosts Bible studies that meet in low income areas of Georgetown, and maintains many individual relationships with people who cannot leave their homes. One weekly Bible Study meets at Stonehaven, a Georgetown Housing Authority low income, 55 and older community. Another meets at Calvary’s Hill Baptist Church and is attended by men who are not comfortable in a traditional church setting but are willing to meet in a smaller group.

Funds provided by The Worship Place are used exclusively as salary for Mr. Boyd, allowing him to focus on the mission of serving the community. The ministry organizes group outings and meals, the expenses of which are met through other financial donations.

Reset Mentoring

Reset Mentoring works with teens who have been arrested and incarcerated in the Williamson County Justice facility. Christian men from Reset Mentoring connect with teens at the facility and follow them back into their communities to support them in their growth and help them get connected to a local church.

Over the past 11 years the program has reached increasing numbers of teens through life skill classes, teen nights, Christian conferences and other connecting activities. The program follows Jesus' model of reaching people where they are, attempting to meet their needs and inviting them to a new life. It also provides practical help, giving kids in the program the tools and materials they need to build a successful life.

The program provides job application and placement, and integrates 6-8 week Dave Ramsey Financial Peace classes, teaching the handling of money God's way as a way to help supported teens overcome the generational poverty that follows 80% of them.

In 2019, the ministry opened its first home staffed by foster parents for teen boys. Residents attend school, church, work, and play sports like other teens, but also complete eight modules to successful adulthood and save three months of living expenses prior to Reset helping them relocate to their first apartment or college campus. The group home is a safe place where residents are free from the danger of abuse, learn how much Jesus loves them, and how they can obtain the life they were created for.

The Salvation Army-Williamson County Service Center

The Salvation Army (TSA) focuses on the interdependence of material, emotional, and spiritual needs, and is guided by the principle of “Doing the Most Good for those in the community. We walk alongside our neighbors to empower them to regain self-sufficiency.” The program targets its efforts at families struggling to avoid chronic homelessness.

Before the pandemic, the Salvation Army Williamson County Service Center executed a two-generational approach to preventing homelessness by 1) providing direct financial assistance through a referral-based structure and 2) offering no-cost youth programs to families struggling with housing instability. Once Covid social distancing requirements were imposed, youth programs were postponed, even as financial needs in the community increased. In response TSA became hyper-focused on providing immediate financial assistance.

All Worship Place donated funds are used to serve residents of Williamson County, and are applied to directly support program and operating expenses such as financial assistance to prevent homelessness and special events; as well as activities that were postponed due to the pandemic but expected to restart during this grant cycle (summer kids camp, community neighborhood outreach & ministry, music program, nursing home ministry, etc).

Santa Rosa Food Pantry

The Santa Rosa Food Pantry and Outreach is a ministry of the Santa Rosa Catholic Church, Florence TX, and is held in the church hall. Its mission is “To nourish hungry people and lead the community in ending hunger.” The pantry is a partner agency with the Central Texas Food Bank (CTFB) and as such is required to follow all USDA guidelines. The program has no paid staff, all workers are volunteers.

The majority of the food pantry’s funds come from Santa Rosa church. It purchases the vast majority of its food from CTFB, and also receives in-kind food assistance from CTFB through the Healthy Options Program for the Elderly (HOPE). In 2020 Covid increased demand for support, resulting in the program serving an average of 1,000 families per quarter for most of the year.

The pantry serves all who request assistance, without regard for religious affiliation, ethnicity or marital status. Volunteers come from within and outside the Santa Rosa church congregation, including some from The Worship Place and other churches in the Georgetown area. Volunteers are required to take a 2-hour course titled Ethics and Integrity in Ministry, which teaches them how to spot signs of child and elder abuse. Each pantry session begins with prayer, and all are invited, but not required to participate.

Soldiers Hospitality House

Soldiers Hospitality House (SHH) is located in Killeen, TX and supports soldiers at Fort Hood. The program is run by Cadence International Ministry to the Military. Cadence's mission is "Sharing the gospel and our lives with the military community" (based on 1 Thess 2:8) and the belief that having strangers in your home for something as simple as a meal is an effective way of sharing the Gospel.

SHH strives to disciple its participants to replicate what it teaches and lives out through its ministry, by building a ministry team equipped to use the gifts God has given each of them. The program directors and five additional staff have a heart to reach the single soldiers living in the barracks at Fort Hood by providing a Christ-centered "home away from home."

Each week multiple levels of Biblical studies are conducted with goals of Bible literacy, tools for self-study and opportunities to teach God's word. The main ministry night is often attended by non-believers or those that are not active in their faith (easily 1/3 of the group). The Gospel message is built into the fiber of the group's conversations and studies, such as weekly dinners and Bible studies, and Sunday fellowship lunches. The program also runs monthly day trips, game nights and other activities as ways to reach the unchurched.

Soldiers Hospitality House is a large home that typically hosts 100-150 soldiers each week. Financial support from The Worship Place helps support evangelizing the lost and discipling those that are followers of Jesus. Worship Place members are welcome to attend weekly sessions. There are also opportunities to help prepare food, serve meals, and help with building maintenance and improvements.

Texas Baptist Children's Home

The Texas Baptist Children's Home, located in Round Rock, TX has the mission to "embrace children and families in need in order to empower and equip them for a promising future." Its vision is to make a difference in people's lives by applying resources to needs, helping those served to reach their God-given potential.

In 2020, Texas Baptist Children's Home carried out this mission by providing residential services to 100 children and 52 single mothers through Family Care. Additionally, 9 young adults received residential services through the Home Base Program. Counselors from the Home delivered over 3,000 hours of individual, family and group counseling to residential clients. The Home also provided aftercare case management and support to 67 single mothers and 182 children. Additionally, Texas Baptist Children's Home impacted the lives of hundreds of other individuals and families by providing helpful information and resource referrals.

Beyond financial support, The Worship Place supports the Children's Home in various ways: Adoption of cottages; assistance in response to house mothers' requests; installation of Christmas outdoor lighting and an indoor Christmas tree; and by hosting spring and fall cookouts at the cottage to meet new residents. Gideons International

Gideons International provides Bibles to individuals and in public areas with the goal of their being taken and read by people who come across them. Gideons also share personal testimony to bring people of all ages, genders, and backgrounds into knowledge of and into personal relationship with Christ.

The Worship Place supports the Gideons Williamson County Camp. The program places Bibles in hotels throughout the county, in hospitals, doctor, dental, and medical offices, and offers them to residents of nursing homes. Bibles are also distributed to students in local schools and college students at Texas A&M, UT, the ACC Leander campus, and Temple College in Taylor.

In 2019, Gideons of Williamson County Camp personally handed out over 13,000 copies of the New Testament and shared in testimony what a relationship with Christ means. In 2020 the same efforts were conducted; however, opportunities for local distribution were decreased due to Covid.

Approximately 7% of the Williamson County Gideon Camp's fundraising goal is supported by The Worship Place. Notably, 100% of donor funds are used to purchase and distribute scriptures. No donor dollars are used to pay for HQ, State Administration, or local camp operating costs. Funds to cover those costs are donated from Gideons members' personal contributions.

Global Gates

Global Gates was co-founded in September 2012 by Chris Clayman, son of The Worship Place Music Minister Jim Clayman, as a mission directed toward reaching Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists and Jews around the world through the global gateway of New York City. The program has grown from a few missionary families in New York to now having missionaries in around 25 cities in 6 countries.

Global Gates' vision is to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth through global gateway cities. Its mission is to see gospel transformation of the world's least evangelized people groups who have come to our gateway cities, and through them spread that Gospel reach back into their overseas homeland communities.

Global Gates' mission plan is to mobilize missionaries, raise the mission climate in global gateway cities, plant reproducing churches, minister in Jesus' name, and launch church planting movements.

The program focuses on global gateway cities with large numbers of unreached people groups where the gospel can be shared without government backlash. Its strongest presence is in New York, Toronto, Houston, and Washington D.C. It also has missions in the San Francisco Bay Area, Pittsburgh, Columbus, Cincinnati, Detroit, Dallas, Austin, Vancouver, Atlanta, Nashville, Raleigh, and many other cities.

Overseas, Global Gates has missionary presence in Greece, India, and Morocco, and at various times, in other "least-reached" countries for language immersion or extended visits. Through gateway city contacts, Global Gates' influence reaches back into some of the least-reached regions of the world.

Jacob's Well

Jacob's Well is one of two ministries managed by Gersan and Betty Valcin in north central Haiti (the other being Village Church, a congregation of about 800 members in Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital city). Jacob's Well is a faith-based humanitarian organization helping build Haiti's future through spiritual, educational, social and economic initiatives. Centered in Ti Guinea, an impoverished village in northern Haiti, Jacob's Well also serves the town of Limbe and surrounding villages. Major focus areas are Evangelism and Outreach; Children, Youth and Family Camp; Church Planting and Spiritual Development; and Radio and TV Ministry.

Jacob's Well's target audience is the Haitian population in and around the village of Ti Guinea. The ministry operates radio Station CIEL 98.7 FM that reaches approximately 150,000 people, an audience that increased with installation of a new, taller transmission tower in early 2021. Sunday afternoon Kid's Club gospel lessons have an audience of 200 children, and Vacation Bible School and youth camps reach about 500 kids a year.

Over the years Worship Place members have sent hundreds of handmade dresses to Jacob's Well through the Dresses for Missions ministry. These dresses are given as gifts to young girls from villages in the vicinity of Jacob's Well. The Worship Place's pastors and members have also traveled to Haiti to participate in ministry training events hosted by Jacob's Well.

Matamoros Children's Home

Matamoros Children's Home is located in the Mexican town of Matamoros, directly across the southern Texas border from Brownsville TX. It is a Christian organization supported 100 percent by donations from Christian organizations and individuals, and operated by Christian staff.

The Children's Home's mission is to operate a safe Christian environment for orphaned, neglected and abused children. Approximately 130 children were residing there in 2020. The Children's Home is also deeply involved in evangelism among the Nahuatl Indians in Mexico. In 2019 the program launched a Christian radio station that transmits the Gospel in the Nahuatl language 14 hours a day.

The Children's Home exists to provide for the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of orphans, neglected and abused children. The program reports that about 99 percent of the children that live there or who have left the Home do so having professed Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. The director, Dr. Saul Camacho reports with pride that "45 children who have grown up here at Matamoros Children's Home are in ministry full time, and more than 60 new churches have been planted through our ministry."

When travel and pandemic restrictions permit, there are many opportunities for members of The Worship Place to travel to Matamoros to support special events and facility maintenance projects at the Children's Home.

Living Water International

Living Water International (LWI) is a faith-based non-profit with a goal of bringing clean water to the rural poor. Its approach involves mobilizing the local church in the area to build sustainability, ownership, and a healthier community while sharing the love of Jesus. The program works in 17 countries in Africa, the Caribbean, India, South and Central America, and Mexico.

Since 1990, Living Water International has completed over 21,000 water projects. In FY 2020 it completed 800 water projects, bringing clean, sustainable water to over 250,000 people; providing sanitation and hygiene training to over 74,000 community members; and presenting the Gospel message to over 270,000 people.

The Worship Place supports Living Water International in two ways. We typically provide a monetary contribution that is sufficient to cover the operational and material cost of digging one or more wells (labor, transportation, shipping, supplies and equipment, etc.); and when circumstances permit, we form and send a team of volunteers from The Worship Place to assist in a well-digging project AND to serve alongside the Living Water International team in presenting hygiene classes to members of the local community (typically students in the local school) who will be benefitting from the clean well water.
